




REVENUE (RM MILLION)




PROFIT ATTRIBUTABLE TO EQUITY SHAREHOLDERS (RM MILLION)

Chairman's Statement

DEAR VALUED SHAREHOLDERS,

On behalf of the Board of Directors, it is my pleasure to present the Annual Report and audited financial statements of Kossan Rubber Industries Bhd. and the Group for the financial year ended 31 December 2013.

ECONOMIC AND INDUSTRY LANDSCAPE

FY2013 was another sluggish year with global GDP growing at a slower pace of 3.0%, compared to 3.1% recorded in 2012. Fiscal drag in the US due to debt ceiling and delayed agreement on the budget which led to US government shutdown in October 2013, resulted in slower than expected GDP growth of 1.9% for the year compared to 2.8% achieved in 2012, despite improved US labor and housing data. In the final quarter of 2013, the Eurozone finally emerged from a prolonged recession with a GDP growth of 0.1% versus a contraction of 0.4% in 2012. On the domestic front, the Malaysian GDP continued to grow steadily at a rate of about 5.0% in 2013 and overall sentiment is considered upbeat with inflationary pressure under controlled and Bank Negara Malaysia ("BNM") holding interest rate steady at 3.0% since May 2011. The glove industry continuously under pressure due to escalating production cost after the implementation of minimum wage policy effective 1 July 2013 and recent tariff hikes in utilities.



Despite the challenging operating environment, I am pleased to report that the Group has achieved record growth in revenue and earnings for FY2013. During the year, Kossan reported a 30.1% growth in profit before taxation which tops all its peers within the glove manufacturing industry. In this current market environment, this is a strong validation of Kossan's business strategies. The Group even moved further to put up three ("3") new plants to cater for overwhelming orders for its new thin version of nitrile gloves launched during the year and invested further to acquire more industrial land banks for its' next phase of expansion.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

It has been a superb year for Kossan with the Group achieving profit before taxation (PBT) of RM180.13 million, a jump of 30.1% on the back of revenue totaling RM1.31 billion in FY2013. Revenue of RM1.31 billion was 5.9% higher as compared to its preceding year's RM1.23 billion. In this financial year, our Glove Division registered a marginal 4.6% increase in sales value on the back of 16% increase in actual quantity of gloves sold. This mismatch was largely due to cheaper selling prices arising from lower raw material costs. The Technical Rubber Products ("TRP) division has delivered an equally strong growth of sales by 13.4% with higher sales in infrastructure and automotive products. This set of commendable performance further validates management's well thought business strategy and strong execution capability against the challenging operating landscape due to soaring production cost and stiffer competition. Including this financial year, the Group is in the 18th year of unbroken profitability record since its first debut in Bursa Malaysia in 1996.

Equally important is the strength of the Group's balance sheet, and I am pleased to inform that it has grown stronger with total assets spurt 11.7% upwards to RM1.11 billion from RM989.94 million in the preceding year. The net gearing ratio improved significant from 16.0% in FY2012 to current year's 10.0%. Out of the total interest bearing bank borrowings of RM150.03 million in the current financial year, approximately 75% are short term in nature comprising trade facilities which is essential for our export driven business. The Group also continues to maintain a healthy cash and bank balance, which stood at RM100.6 million as at December. This reflects the Group's superior earnings capability by consistently generating solid returns from its ongoing business expansion. Another notable achievement was the 16.5% growth in our net assets per share attributable to shareholders of the company. Net asset per share was 113 sen in the current year as compared to 97 sen in its preceding financial year. The Return on Assets ("ROA") and Return on Equity ("ROE") improved to 12.7% and 19.4% respectively versus 10.6% and 17.0% in FY2012.

I am also very pleased to note that, despite it being a challenging year, the strategic business measures adopted by the Group all these years such as R&D efforts, continuous improvement in its production processes, more effective cost-savings activities, new and innovative products, more refined product-mix with higher output on better margin products, successful marketing approach and strategies; reliable customer delivery and sound risk management system have blended well and yielded notable and sustainable returns. This will remain the Group's main focus to ensure we deliver to our shareholders uninterrupted and growing returns in their investments.

CORPORATE DEVELOPMENTS

- (a) We have completed a bonus issue of 319,733,952 ordinary shares on the basis of one (1) bonus share for every one (1) existing share held in the Company in November 2013. With the completion of this bonus issue exercise, the number of shares quoted on Bursa Malaysia has been enlarged to 639,467,904 shares. Since the Company first debuted in the stock exchange in 1996, our shareholders have been rewarded with five rounds of bonus shares including this. The Company has also reissued its treasury shares totaling 1,114,400 shares in the open market on Bursa Securities between 11th to 31st October 2013.
- (b) In line with the Group's master expansion program, the Group has acquired three (3) plots of freehold land in the Klang Valley with a total land size of 82 acres through its wholly-owned subsidiaries Ideal Quality Sdn. Bhd. and Perusahaan Getah Asas Sdn. Bhd. for RM75.5 million.

DELIVERING VALUE TO SHAREHOLDERS

The ultimate measure of a company's success is through the consistent enrichment of its shareholders. With this belief, the delivery of uninterrupted returns to shareholders remains a high priority for the Group.

During the year under review, Kossan has on 19 December distributed an interim tax-exempt dividend of 3.5 sen or 7% per ordinary share of 50 sen in conjunction with the financial result announcement for the third quarter ended 30 September 2013. Total dividend paid was RM22.38 million.

The Board has recommended paying a final tax-exempt dividend of 3.5 sen per ordinary share amounting to RM22.38 million for FY2013 and this final dividend is subject to shareholders' approval at the forthcoming 34th Annual General Meeting. Total dividend declared for the year will be 7.0 sen per ordinary share amounting to RM44.76 million should the final tax-exempt dividend be approved by shareholders at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

This is the 18th consecutive year that Kossan has declared dividends to shareholders since its listing on Bursa Malaysia in 1996.

In 2013, Kossan share price increased by 157.1% from RM1.68 (adjusted for bonus issue) as at the end of 2012 to RM4.32 as at the end of 2013. Excluding dividend paid, a shareholder of Kossan share would have enjoyed a total return of 157.1% for 2013, based on the price of Kossan share as at end of 2013.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Group has long recognized and acknowledged the importance of a corporate culture that emphasizes good corporate social responsibility ("CSR") and corporate citizenship. Besides driving sustainable profit growth and interrupted returns for the shareholders, the Group also undertakes reasonable amount of CR activities to uphold the betterment of its employees' welfare, sustainability of the industry and well being of the community surrounding us during the year under review. As the Group continues to expand its operations, it will strive to further broaden and deepen its sustainability and CSR endeavours. The Group's countless efforts on CSR speak loud its commitment to uphold its Vision.

MOVING FORWARD

The Group has performed remarkably well in 2013 despite the challenging operating environment. Moving into 2014, we may have started the year with a cautious outlook on the back of growing competition attributed to rapid capacity expansion and high production cost arising from increases in utilities costs which include gas and electricity. While we acknowledge the tougher operating environment, we will continue to stay focus on our business targets and chart our own direction of growth. We will also continue to leverage on our technological capability to stay competitive in our business. With all the efforts and good business strategies, I am optimistic that the Group will perform better and deliver stronger earnings in 2014.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Despite it being a challenging year, with relatively high production cost and growing competition during the year under review, the Group has managed to record the strongest earnings growth in the glove manufacturing industry. In this respect, I wish to thank the senior management and all the employees for putting in their great efforts, commitment, perseverance, passion and hard work in contributing to this impressive performance.

Three of our executive directors Mr. Lim Kuang Wang (and his alternate, Mr. Lim Leng Bung), Mr. Lim Kwan Hwa and one independent non executive director Dato' Tai Chang Eng @ Teh Chang Ying who have served the board and contributed immensely to the growth of the Group in the last 19 years have withdrawn from the board during the year. I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to them for their excellent contributions and invaluable advices to the Group. Meantime, do let me welcome Messrs. Tan Kong Chang, Lim Siau Tian, Lim Siau Hing and Lim Ooi Chow to the board as executive directors and Mr. Lee Choo Hock as an independent non executive director. Equipped with strong educational background and blended with exposures in banking, accounting, finance, engineering, quality control, business development and marketing fields, I have strong confident that my newly appointed board members will be able to contribute effectively to the Group.

I also wish to thank all our valued customers, suppliers, business partners, bankers, shareholders, government authorities, research analysts and members of the press and media for your continued strong support, confidence, trust and contributions to our success during the past year.

Managing Director's Review of Operation



The good run in FY2012 continued into FY2013 with profit before taxation grew by 30.1% to RM180.13 million compared to RM138.45 million of in the preceding year. Production volume for both glove and technical rubber products ("TRP") recorded impressive increase despite the challenging operating environment and competition. I must say that our efforts and hard work paid off when the Group reported the strongest earnings growth in the glove industry. This momentous achievement is the direct result of five ("5") key strategic measures adopted by the Group in the area of research & development, automation, production process optimization, business process computerization and investing in human capital. This is the 18th consecutive year that Kossan has delivered uninterrupted profitability since listed in 1996 and this underpins Management's commitment towards creating and delivering long term returns to its shareholders.

EXAMINATION GLOVE DIVISION

For the year under review, the actual quantity of gloves produced and sold increased by approximately 16% while the sales in value registered a marginal 4.6% growth. The non-reflective sales value was attributed to lower raw material prices in both natural rubber ("NR") and nitrile butadiene rubber ("NBR") which have tumbled by 15% and 22% respectively since the end of FY2012.

Sales growth from clean room segment becomes more apparent as more customers approved and accepted our clean room gloves and clean room disposables. Despite the revenue contribution from this clean room segment is relatively small, approximately 2.6% of the total glove sales, the growth potential is voluminous and with our continuous marketing efforts to penetrate wider market place, we have strong confidence that contribution will turn more significant in the coming years.

We added some 1.5 billion pieces of gloves in the current year and as of December 2013, our production capacity stood at 16.0 billion pieces and as usual, Kossan operates with high utilization rate of above 85% consistently all these years. On top of adding new production lines, we continue to carry out revamp works on the existing lines and upgrading the facilities on all our production floors to ensure high productivity at all time and optimizing the input resources. During the year, we have also converted more production capacity into producing nitrile gloves which yield better profit margins compared to natural rubber. The production mix for NBR and NR stood at 55% and 45% respectively at the end of December 2013.

For the past 12 months, we have channeled reasonable amount of resources to advance the degree of automation on our production floors to reduce reliance on general workers and to arrest rising wages arising from the implementation of minimum wage in July 2013. With more routine processes being automated and computerized, overall quality of our output becomes more consistent with lower reject rate. Unnecessary production wastage which means higher cost, due to human errors is also being capped. Concerted efforts have also been placed to develop various systems and mechanisms that enable optimization in utilities consumption including water, electricity and gas.

Another notable achievement is the invention of the industry's lightest weight NBR powder free glove. This new 3 gram NBR glove comes with good barrier properties and distinctive strength and it is another technology breakthrough that Kossan has achieved in its R&D road map. Since its maiden launch and introduction to our customers in early 2014, the reception to these 3 gram weight powder free gloves had been overwhelming. We are expediting the construction of our new plants to ensure early and timely delivery to our supportive customers of this new generation thin version NBR gloves. Again, we create value for our customers by making the glove thin, unique and yet able to meet various regulatory specifications. We manage to bring savings on logistic cost as the glove loadings per container is now higher and for the same quantity of gloves will require lower frequency of shipments as compared with thicker gloves.

Managing Director's Review Of Operation (continued)

As for production capacity expansion, we have started the construction of three (3) new plants at two (2) different locations in June 2013. These 3 plants are installed with 17 double-formers high output and efficient production lines and are capable of producing a minimum of 42,000 pieces of gloves per hour. Once completed in August 2014, these 3 plants will enlarge our existing production capacity to 22 billion pieces. Currently, one of the 3 plants has been completed in March 2014 and has commenced its maiden production in April 2014.

All our hard work and efforts paid off when our profit margins continue to expand in four ("4") consecutive quarters despite higher production cost compared to the previous year after the implementation of the minimum wage policy and increasing chemical cost. We are confident that this positive note will continue in 2014 when the synergistic effects gradually developed and the new production capacity starts to fill up expanding orders.

TECHNICAL RUBBER PRODUCTS ("TRP")

Our TRP business did equally well with revenue grew by 13.4% to RM160.27 million for the year under review. Our infrastructure and automotive products were key contributors to this impressive growth.

During the year under review, Kossan was awarded a contract to supply some 2,000 pieces of seismic bearings for the Second Penang Bridge project. The Second Penang Bridge, spanning 23.5km, is currently the longest bridge in Southeast Asia and was completed in November 2013. The bearings for the bridge not only protect the bridge from earthquakes but also provide significant cost savings as the technologies used lessen the need to strengthen the existing piling system. Our success story does not end here. With this mega bridge project as a strong reference and the well recognized technical capability Kossan enjoyed in the rubber products field, we have also recently won contracts to supply bearings to our country's MRT projects. Besides supplying to local market, our bearings are also sold to Indonesia and Middle-East countries.

Operating with the largest compounding capacity of 10,000 metric tons per annum and coupled with our track records in supplying various high technical input rubber products for the last 30 years to both local and overseas markets, we are confident Kossan will continue to stand in a strong position to tap on greater business opportunities on the back of economy recovery in the West in 2014.

PROSPECTS

The glove industry will remain buoyant as the world demand for gloves is growing. Gloves are not only confined for medical application but also being widely used in many other applications including food, household, industrial and general usage. On the back of stable raw material prices and increasing demand for various rubber products riding on the global economy recovery trail, despite at slow pace, we are confident that 2014 will be another exciting year for Kossan and the entire glove industry.

On the flip side, the glove industry will continue to face pressure arising from escalating production cost and growing competition moving into 2014 and beyond. The production cost has been consistently on the rise since the implementation of minimum wage policy effective July 2013 and increase in electricity tariff by 17% effective January 2014. This situation is expected to worsen further when we have to factor in another 20% increase in natural gas price in May 2014.

As far as Kossan is concerned, we are vigilant to the current tough operating environment where production costs are on the rise, growing competition, heightening risk of overcapacity, pricing pressures and ever rising quality requirement from our customers. In our business philosophy, we often take all these challenges as an opportunity to improve ourselves and fortify our position further within the glove industry. Our performance in 2013 where we have delivered record earnings growth is the best evidence of our capability to ride through all these business challenges.

We will continue to place great emphasis and allocate sufficient financial resources to boost our internal strength through continuous improvement programs on cost reduction, product quality improvement, develop new unique products; and reaching out into wider market place. To achieve that, we have been focusing on five (5) key areas which formed the backbone of Kossan's overall strengths:

1. Research and Development ("R&D")

R&D continued to be the driving force in our business. It is the key strength that transforms and differentiates us from our peers and enables us to bring value added and unique products to our customers with fair prices. Our R&D team comprises qualified and well experienced engineers and chemists. The R&D team is focusing on new product development, product quality and process improvement and developing high speed efficient production dipping lines.

Managing Director's Review Of Operation (continued)

2. Automation

More financial resources have been placed to advance the degree of production process automation from latex compounding, production dipping and glove stripping to final glove packing. Automation is the key and long term solution to reduce reliance on unskilled labors and to arrest the impact from increasing wages. Automation is also able to minimize costly human errors and unnecessary rejects or wastages besides bringing consistency in product quality.

3. Production Process Optimization

In order to address the escalating production cost attributed to higher utilities cost (electricity, gas and water) and raw materials, we have invested in various technologies, sophisticated equipments and human resources to optimize and bring down the consumption of utilities and raw materials.

4. Business Process Computerization

For more efficient and effective business process, we have in-house developed software and acquired SAP computer software systems to undertake day to day stringent and routine processes control. This improves overall human efficiencies and helps in eliminating redundant and non value added processes.

5. Investing in Human Capital

We continued to invest and develop our human capital. Acknowledging the shortage of talents in the country, we need to develop and train our employees in order to defend our leading position in the glove industry. Being a progressive employer, Kossan has a comprehensive human capital management program that was developed to attract and retain the right people, nurture talents and groom future leaders. We engaged extensive and effective trainings for our employees to help them keep abreast of current trends and build up the competency skills in order to perform their tasks more effectively.

The glove industry has evolved into a technology driven type of industry and in the future, glove manufacturers will need to compete in technology in order to survive in business. Acknowledging the importance of technology, we want to invest more in technology particularly in the areas of high speed and efficient dipping lines, latex formulation technology, advanced production process technology and overall plant automation and computerization in order to stay ahead in competition.

Mr. Lim Siau Hing is a nephew of Dato' Lim Kuang Sia and Mr. Lim Kuang Yong. Messrs Lim Siau Tian, Lim Siau Hing and Lim Ooi Chow are cousins.

Corporate Governance Statement

The Board of Directors ("the Board") of Kossan Rubber Industries Bhd. ("Kossan") wishes to confirm that the Board had continuously endured to maintain the highest standards of Corporate Governance throughout the financial year ended 31 December 2013. In ensuring the application of the principles of Corporate Governance in its business activities, the Board regularly reviews and maintains all identifiable means to ensure that the Company's Corporate Governance Standards complies with the Malaysian Code on Corporate Governance 2012 (the "Code") and to that effect has put in place self regulating processes in the operating procedures of the Company.

The Board is pleased to present the Statement on Corporate Governance for the year ended 31 December 2013 outlining the application of the principles as set out in the Code.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

1. Establish Clear Roles and Responsibilities of the Board and Management

The ultimate decision making body in the Group is the Board of the holding company, Kossan. It has the responsibility of overall governance of the Group. Together with the subsidiaries' boards, it takes full responsibility in ensuring businesses are carried out in compliance with governance practices and in a transparent and objective manner. Its overall objective is to enhance the value of its shareholders by achieving the strategic objectives of the Group with the implementation of the Code.

1.1 Strengthen Composition Of The Board

The Board of Directors shall designate one of its members to serve as Chairman of the Board. The powers and responsibilities of the Chairman of the Board shall be set forth in the Board Charter, as supplemented from time to time by resolutions of the Board.

As at the date of this Annual Report, the Board is represented by nine Directors, six of whom are non independent executive directors, whilst three are independent non executive directors. The Chairman of the Board is an independent non-executive director and the Group Managing Director is an executive director.

The Board has no specific policy on setting targets on female candidates to be appointed to the Board. The Board currently has one female director who is an independent non-executive director. With the current composition, the Board feels that its members have the necessary knowledge, experience, requisite range of skills and competence to enable them to discharge their duties and responsibilities effectively. All directors on the Board are well qualified with many years of experience in their respective fields of expertise.

A brief profile of each Director is set out on page 9 to 11 of this Annual Report.

1.2 Board Balance

The wide mix of different skill sets and professional diversity of the members provides an environment where deliberations draw a wide range of view points before a decision is arrived at. The Board of Kossan acknowledges that a well balanced board will benefit the organization in quickly appraising matters at hand and to competently arrive at decisions which will enhance the performance of the Group.

The Chairman of the Board is an independent non-executive director with clear and distinct separation in his duties and responsibilities from those of the Group Managing Director, who is an executive director.

The Board is satisfied that it has achieved an optimal size that reflects the needs of the kind of businesses the Group is involved in as well as the diversity of the Company's shareholders, employees, customers, stakeholders and communities. The Kossan Board has their independent directors, in compliance with the Bursa's Main Market Listing Requirements, which stipulates that no less than one third of the Board must be comprised of Independent Directors.

1.3. Board Membership Criteria

The Nominating Committee works with the Board on an annual basis to determine the appropriate characteristics, skills, and experience required for the Board as whole and its individual members with the objective of having a Board with diverse backgrounds and experience in business. Characteristics expected of all Directors include independence, integrity, high personal and professional ethics, sound business judgement, and the ability and willingness to commit sufficient time to the Board.

In evaluating the suitability of individual Board members, the Board takes into account many factors, including skills, knowledge, expertise, experience, professionalism, time commitment to effectively discharge his/her role as a director, contribution, background, character, integrity and competence.

The Board evaluates each individual in the context of the Board as a whole, with the objective of recommending a group that can best sustain and perpetuate the success of the Company's business and represent shareholders' interests through the exercise of sound judgment, using its diversity of experience. In determining whether to recommend a Director for re-election, the Nominating Committee also considers the Director's past attendance at meetings, participation in and contribution to the activities of the Board.

1.4. Role of Chairman and Group Managing Director

The Board has always ensured that the position of the Chairman and the Group Managing Director is not held by the same person. In this regards our Chairman, Dato' Haji Mokhtar Bin Haji Samad is an Independent Non-Executive member of the Board.

There is a clear and separate division of responsibility in the roles and duties of the Chairman and the Group Managing Director. The Group Managing Director is the officer involved in the day-to-day running of the affairs of the Group.

1.5. Board Responsibilities and Duties

The Board of Kossan has the ultimate responsibility in providing overall stewardship over the management of the companies in the Group. The Board ensures that Management has in place appropriate processes for risk assessment, management and internal controls and monitoring performance against set benchmarks. The Board works with Senior Management in advancing the interests of the Company.

At its meetings, the Board regularly reviews the business financial results, adopts and reviews risk management initiatives, oversees the implementation and effectiveness of internal control systems, and enforces the compliance of legal and statutory requirements within the Group.

The Board has delegated certain responsibilities to Board Committees which operate in accordance with the Terms of Reference approved by the Board and delegated the day to day management of the Business of the Group to the Group Managing Director and Management, subject to an agreed authority limit.

The Independent Non-Executive directors are active in their roles providing independent judgment and contributing actively in the deliberations on policies, providing unbiased and independent views when required. They also act to protect the interest of the minority shareholders in respect of policies and decisions deliberated by the Board.

The functions of the Board are summarized as follows:-

- reviewing and adopting strategic plans, including setting performance objectives and approving operating budgets for the Group and ensuring that the strategies promote sustainability;
- overseeing the conduct of the Company's businesses and build sustainable values for shareholders;
- reviewing the procedures to identify principal risks and ensuring the implementation of appropriate internal controls and mitigation measures;
- succession planning, including appointing, assessing, training, fixing the compensation of and where appropriate, replacing executive directors and senior management;
- developing and implementing a Corporate Disclosure Policy (including an investor relations programme or shareholder communications policy) for the Group; and
- reviewing the adequacy and the integrity of the Group's risk management and internal control systems and management information system, including systems for compliance with applicable laws, regulations, rules, directives and guidelines.

1.6. Board Evaluation

The Board believes in the process of full participation. Although the Board has not put in a structured evaluation mechanism, the Chairman encourages members to discuss any matters for deliberation with open feedback, constructive criticism and exchanging of information. All members of the Board Committees are evaluated on a yearly basis by the Nominating Committee before they are either re-appointed or rotated.

1.7. Reinforce Independence of the Board

Tenure

The Board does not fix a maximum tenure limit for Directors as the Board is of the view that there are significant advantages to be gained from the long-serving Directors who possess tremendous insight and knowledge of the Company's affairs. Furthermore, the ability of a Director to serve effectively as an Independent Director is very much a function of his calibre, qualification, experience and personal qualities, particularly of his integrity and objectivity in discharging his responsibilities in good faith in the best interest of the Company and his duty to vigilantly safeguard the interests of the minority shareholders of the Company, has no direct relationship to his tenure as an Independent Director. Although term limits could help to ensure that there are fresh ideas and viewpoints available to the Board, they do pose the disadvantage of losing experienced Independent Directors who over time have developed better insight in the Company's and/or the Group's operations and therefore, provide an increasing contribution to the effectiveness of the Board as a whole. The Board therefore opined that imposing a fixed term limit for Independent Directors does not necessarily assure independence.

Details of Directors who are seeking to remain Independent at the coming Annual General Meeting and the basis or justifications as recommended by the Board are shown in the Notice of Annual General Meeting on page 93 to 97 of this Annual Report.

Directors Independence

An Independent Director of the company is a Director who is independent of management and free from any business or other relationship which could interfere with the exercise of independent judgement or the ability to act in the best interests of the company. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, an Independent Director is one who:

- is not an executive director of the company or any related corporation of the company;
- has not been within the last two (2) years and is not an officer (except as Independent Director) of the company or related corporation of the company;
- is not a major shareholder of the company, or any related corporation of the company;
- is not a relative of any executive director, officer or major shareholder of the company or its related corporation. For this purpose, "relative" means the spouse, parent, brother, sister, child (including adopted or step child) and the spouse of such brother, sister or child;
- is not acting as a nominee or representative of any executive director or major shareholder of the company or any of its related corporation; or
- is not engaged as a professional adviser by the company or any of its related corporation either personally or through a firm or company of which he is a partner, director or major shareholder, as the case may be.

2. Foster Commitment of Directors

2.1. Board Procedures

The Board meets on a scheduled basis at least five (5) times a year. Special Board meetings are held as and when the need arises to consider special matters.

The Kossan Board governs the subsidiary companies through the subsidiary boards. Scheduled Board meetings have structured agenda that are drawn up for the Board's deliberation and decision making. All Board meetings are set before the beginning of the year with firm dates, venue and time to enable Directors to plan their time to ensure full attendance.

The board members notify the Board or the Chairman before accepting new directorship in other public listed companies. The number of directorship held by each Director complied with Bursa's Main Market Listing Requirements.

The Board meetings also have a pre-determined set of matters for the Board's review. Among these are the financial performance of the Group and the operating performances. All Board papers for consideration and discussion will be circulated to members at least three (3) days prior to the meetings to ensure Directors have sufficient time to study them and be prepared for meaningful discussions.

The company secretary issues a notice of meeting prior to each Board meeting together with relevant Board papers and any corporate announcement for release to Bursa Malaysia. Management and professional advisor may be invited by the Board if there is a need for information or advice on matters that require expertise knowledge.

2.2. Number of Board Meetings and Directors Attendance

For the year under review, the Board held five regular meetings excluding the Annual General Meeting. The matter for review during these meetings included the financial performances of the Group, the quarterly performance and reporting, risk management matters, internal controls and reports of the committees of the Board.

All proceedings of the Board meetings are duly recorded and minuted clearly stating the issues discussed and decisions made. The following are details of the number of Board meetings held during the year 2013 and the record of Directors' attendance during those meetings:-

2.4. Supply of Information

The supply of information to the Board is managed in an orderly and timely manner. For matters that require detailed attention, the Board has empowered the committees to obtain all information that is required and to deliberate as well as to advise the Board of Kossan on the course of action. It is through these channels that the Board extends its policies and strategies to the respective managements. The Directors on the subsidiary Boards have the responsibility of ensuring that policies and directions of the Kossan board are kept in focus and strategies are implemented accordingly.

All Directors on the Board and Committees of the Board have full and unrestricted access to senior management and the company secretary on all matters requiring information for deliberation and any regulatory and administrative matters. Information provided to the Board are compiled into reports via the Board papers which are circulated to Directors in timely manner to enable them to discharge their duties and responsibilities effectively.

All Directors have the consent of the Board, whether acting as full Board or on individual capacity, to take independent professional advise at Company' expense, where necessary in furtherance of their duties.

2.5. Company Secretary

The Company Secretary of Kossan is a professional member of Malaysian Institute of Accountants who is suitably qualified, competent and capable of carrying out the duties required. The key roles of the Company Secretary include providing unhindered advice and services for the Directors, as and when the need arises, enhance the effective functioning of the Board, ensure regulatory compliance and ensure that Board procedures and applicable rules are observed.

3. Appointment and Re-election to the Board

3.1. Appointment to the Board

The Board has mandated the Nominating Committee with the responsibility of identifying, assessing and recommending suitable candidates for appointment to the Board and Board Committees. The Nominating Committee is comprised exclusively of non-executive independent directors.

The Nominating Committee carries out the assessment, evaluation of the potential candidates in respect of appropriate skills, knowledge, expertise, experience, professionalism and integrity.

The Nominating Committee only recommends a candidate but the authority of appointment lies with the full Board.

3.2. Re-election of Directors

The Company's Articles of Association provides that at least one third of the Directors including the Group Managing Director retire from the office at the Annual General Meeting. Any Directors appointed during the year to fill a casual vacancy will retire at the next Annual General Meeting any may offer themselves for re-election.

The Board has empowered the Nominating Committee to undertake the review of Directors seeking re-election. The Committee also reviews cases for re-appointment of Directors who retire in accordance with Section 129 of the Companies Act, 1965 and the retention of independent directors who has served cumulatively for more than nine years.

4. Directors' Remuneration

4.1. Directors Remuneration Policy

The Board adopts a remuneration policy that fairly supports the Directors undertaking responsibility and fiduciary duties to steer, grow and achieve the Company's long term strategies, thereby enhancing the value of its shareholders.

The Remuneration Committee is responsible for evaluating, deliberating and recommending to the Board the compensation and benefits that are fairly guided by market norms and industry practices for the business the Company is in.

The Remuneration Committee also assists the Board to put in place a framework and benchmark value for other compensation and benefits to Directors. It recommends the Directors' fee payable to members of the Board which is then deliberated and decided by the Board and before it is presented at the Annual General Meeting for shareholders' approval.

The Board and Remuneration Committee strive to put in place a fair structure of compensation suited for an organization of this size and market sector and business complexity to attract and retain directors who have the right calibre, skills and experience to contribute meaningfully towards the success of the business.

4.2. Basic Salaries and Fees

All non-executive directors receive an annual director's fee upon approval of shareholders at the Annual General Meeting. An executive director receives a remuneration package which includes a basic salary, discretionary bonus and other benefits-in-kind.

The Remuneration Committee and the Board strive to implement a formal and transparent procedure of remuneration for executive directors of the Company.

The remuneration package is reviewed annually by the Remuneration Committee in relation to the business strategy, long term objectives of the Company, market demand and supply, scale of responsibility, performance of the business and individual performance evaluation. All other benefits-in kind are specified in the contract of service. The benefits-in-kind include company car and driver, personal telecommunications facilities, club memberships, medical and dental coverage and vacation.

8.1. Financial Reporting

To ensure this, the Board has put in place adequate financial processes that are aimed at keeping the Group's accounting records and transactions in accordance with accepted accounting standards. This ensures the preparation of the annual financial statements that present a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Group and Company at the reporting dates.

The Board of Kossan is also committed to ensure that it presents a balanced and comprehensive assessment of the operation and financial results of the Group on a quarterly basis via its interim financial reports. The Audit Committee assists the Board under its terms of reference in ensuring that the Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with approved applicable Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards and are in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 1965.

The Statement of Directors' Responsibility in relation to the Audited Financial Statements is presented on page 25 of this Annual Report.

8.2. Internal Control

The Board maintains a sound system of Internal Control to manage the day-to-day running of the business activities of the Group. The internal control system is a mechanism of checks and balances in the operating and financial processes wherein the transactions and processes are carried out and are subjected to this self checking mechanism. The management of the companies have established such control mechanism within their Standard Operating Procedures to ensure its continuous and effective operations.

The Board has mandated the Audit Committee with the overall responsibility of ensuring adequacy, completeness and effectiveness of this internal control system. The Audit Committee undertakes periodic reviews and monitors the compliance to these systems via the Internal Audit Department who carries out audit checks on such control processes and provide feedback on its effectiveness and compliance at the operating level. Any weaknesses or variances reported by the Internal Auditor to the Audit Committee will be forwarded to management to rectify any weaknesses in those control processes.

The Internal Audit Department acts as a unit independent of management to carry out the audit of management processes and business transactions of the operating units by way of pre-approved audit programme and reports its findings back to the Audit Committee. This independent mechanism provides independent feedback of the accountability, adequacy and effectiveness of the system of internal controls in place, giving the assurance that the Board needs to fulfil its responsibility. The Internal Audit Function is complemented by a firm of outsourced internal auditor.

The Audit Committee monitors the feedback and reports of the Internal Audit Department for matters of non-compliance, weaknesses in internal control systems or the lack of it and monitors the implementation of any such inadequacies by the Management.

Full details of the Statement of Risk Management and Internal Control are presented on pages 26 to 28 of this Annual Report.

8.3. Relationship with Internal and External Auditors.

The Board maintains good working relationship with the external auditors of the Group, Messrs KPMG, through the Audit Committee. The Audit Committee acts as the platform used by both the external and internal auditors for communication and avenue to access the Board. The Audit Committee invites the external auditors to attend its meeting as and when required but at least twice a year when they intend to begin the final year audit and when they have completed their audit. The internal auditors meet the Committee at least four times a year. During such meeting the auditors highlights and discusses the nature, scope of the audit, audit programme, internal controls and problems that may require the attention of the Board.

In compliance to Bursa's Main Market Listing Requirements and Corporate Governance principles the Audit Committee reviews the scope of work, independence, objectivity and the feedback and results of the audits conducted by both the external and internal auditors.

The Board, through the Audit Committee, provides general guidelines governing the contracts for the provision of non-audit services which can be entered into by the external auditors. The Audit Committee has also obtained the confirmation from the external auditors of their independence.

The Audit Committee also makes arrangements to meet and discuss with the external and internal auditors separately without the presence of management on any matters relating to the Group and its audit activities.

9. Ensure Timely and High Quality Disclosure and Strengthen Relationship Between Company and Shareholders.

The Board is committed under its Corporate Governance obligation to have an effective channel of communication with shareholders and the investing public. It affirms that the primary channel to engage and communicate with its shareholders is during the Annual General Meeting.

During these general meetings, the Board provides an account of the affairs of the business that was undertaken by the Group and its future direction. The Annual Report is tabled at this meeting and the shareholders can engage the Board in productive dialogue.

In respect of the investing public, the Board has put in place an investor relations initiative where a page is dedicated to investor relations on the Company's corporate website (www.kossan.com.my) wherein official announcements made to Bursa are made available.

Furthermore, the Group Managing Director and the Investor Relations Manager arrange regular face to-face briefing and discussions with analysts and investors to provide information on developments and to take questions on matters relating to their interest.

The Company's Annual General Meeting is a crucial forum where the Company's shareholders meet to have discussions with the Board of Directors on the affairs of the business. Notice of the Annual General Meeting is sent out to shareholders at last 21 days ahead of the meeting date together with Financial Statements and agenda for the meeting.

The Board encourages all shareholders to attend the Annual General Meeting and to participate in its proceedings. Every opportunity is given to shareholders to seek clarification on the performance of the Company and the Group. The Chairman also shared with shareholders of the meeting responses to questions submitted in advance by the Minority Shareholder Watchdog Group (MSWG). All the resolutions set out in the Notice of the AGM were put to vote. The outcome of the AGM will be announced to Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad on the same meeting day.

The Company will encourage the adoption of poll voting for all the resolutions at future AGM.

The full agenda of the 34th Annual General Meeting of Kossan is presented on page 93 to 97 of this Annual Report.

The Board confirms that the Group has made strong efforts of maintaining high standards of Corporate Governance throughout the year to seek to achieve the highest level of integrity and ethical standards in all its business dealings.

WORKPLACE

In stepping up the welfare and professionalism of our employees, the Group has conducted trainings with emphasis on quality for the staff to improve further their leadership skills and work quality. Various in house and external trainings have been made available to relevant employees after having determined the area of improvement needed. In this respect, the Group has engaged an external consultant-trainer to facilitate the world renowned and highly acclaimed FranklinCovey's signature program, The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People for the supervisory and managerial level employees during the year.

The Group employs a significant number of foreign and out-stationed workers; as such the Group has constructed or rented hostels within the vicinity of our plants to provide accommodation for this group of employees.

Health and safety are two major concerns at our workplace. On occupational safety, the Group strives to comply with all the Department of Occupational Safety and Health Malaysia ("DOSH") standards on health and safety perspective. The Group complies with the Occupational Safety and Health Act ("OSHA") strictly. The Group has also set up a Work Safety Committee to develop policies and maintain a safe and healthy workplace for all its employees, contractors and fellow visitors. All its workers on the production floors are made compulsory to attend trainings, safety meetings, inspections and prevention programs. These programs are aimed to alert employees on the importance of safety and hygiene conditions in the workplace.

All our employees are reasonably covered for any unforeseen mishaps through the various levels of insurance including coverage on medical, hospitalization benefits and critical illness besides the usual personal accident insurance.

MARKET PLACE

In the market place, the Group practices strong leadership through sound corporate governance and ethical business conducts. Apart from adhering to rules and regulations, the Group has refreshed its principles and standards of good governance and business ethics in line with its commitment to effective corporate governance. On top of that, we remain supportive to our suppliers and treasure our business relationships with all our customers. As part of our effort to improve ourselves and grow together with our suppliers and customers, we conduct annual satisfaction surveys to draw feedbacks on our products and services and areas that require improvement.

Statement on Risk Management and Internal Control

INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to paragraph 15.26(b) of the Main Market Listing Requirements of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad, the Board of Directors (Board) of listed issuers is required to provide a Statement on Risk Management and Internal Control of the Group in their Annual Report.

Set out below is the Board's Statement on Risk Management and Internal Control prepared in accordance with the "Statement on Risk Management & Internal Control – Guidelines for Directors of Public Listed Issuers" and Principle 6 and Recommendation 6.1 of the "Malaysian Code on Corporate Governance 2012".

BOARD RESPONSIBILITY

The Board acknowledges and affirms their responsibility in establishing an effective governance, risk management and internal control system that would provide reasonable assurance that risks are managed effectively and efficiently within the Group's defined risk appetite and tolerance.

The Board in discharging their responsibilities is committed to maintaining a sound risk management and internal control system to safeguard shareholders' investments and the Group's assets as well as other stakeholders' interests.

The Group's risk management and internal control system is designed to manage, rather than eliminate, the risk of failure to achieve business objectives. Notwithstanding and due to the limitations that are inherent in any system of risk management and internal control, the system can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement, losses or fraud.

The Board is assisted by Management in the implementation of the Board's policies and procedures on the system of risk management and internal control. Management is responsible, amongst others, implementing the process for identifying, evaluating, monitoring and reporting of risks and internal control; design, implement and monitor the risk management framework inline with the Group's business objectives and risk appetite; identify changes to risk and taking appropriate actions to mitigate and control these risks; and provide assurance to the Board that the risk management and internal control system is operating adequately and effectively.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board recognizes that risk management and internal control forms an integral part of the Group's business operations and therefore has put in place a Risk Management framework for identifying, evaluating and managing the significant risks faced by the Group in its achievement of objectives and strategies.

The Risk Management framework contains the following key elements:

- A Risk management policy and guidelines outlining the risk strategy, risk management policy and risk management structure of the Group. The risk organization structure details the lines of reporting and responsibility of the Board, Audit Committee, Risk Management Committee, and Management levels. The risk management policy and guidelines is subject to review and improvement from time to time in order to enhance the risk management process and framework within the Group.
- A Risk register containing risk profiles of the business operations within the Group which have been developed and communicated
 to the Board. The development of such risk profiles involved identification of key risks facing by the Group's core business unit, the
 potential impact and likelihood of those risks occurring, the control effectiveness and the action plans being taken to manage those
 risks to the desired level.
- A Risk Management Committee, set-up with the overall responsibility for establishing a strategic approach to risk management within
 the Group. The Committee reviews the effectiveness of the Group's risk management in relation to the core strategic objectives of
 the Group, identifies and communicates to the Board and Management with regards to the changing and emerging risks and to
 formulate action plans to address key risks and control issues in accordance with their profiles of the Group. In line with the Group's
 existing organization model, the line management remains primarily responsible for the management of risk.

The Board believes that maintaining a sound system of risk management and internal control is premise on a clear understanding and appreciation of the aforementioned key elements of the Risk Management framework.

Statement on Risk Management and Internal Control (continued)

SYSTEM OF INTERNAL CONTROL

Whilst the Board focuses on effective risk oversight and setting the tone and culture towards an effective risk management and internal control structure, the management is entrusted with the implementation of the system of internal control encompassing the types of control including strategic, financial, operational, and compliance issues.

The key features and roles of the Board and management on the system of internal control are described as follows:-

- At quarterly board meetings, the Board members review the performance and profitability of the Group, discuss and deliberate on the business development, management, corporate issues and regulatory matters affecting the Group.
- Various Board Committees with formal terms of reference governing their functions and duties delegated by the Board have been established to assist the Board in overseeing internal controls and Board effectiveness.
- The Group Managing Director (GMD) plays a pivotal role in communicating the Board's expectations of the system of internal control to management. This is achieved through his active participation in the operations of the business as well as attendance at various scheduled management and operational level committee meetings where operational and financial risks are discussed and dealt with. The GMD will update the Board of any significant matters that require the latter's immediate attention.
- Clear defined organization structure defining the delegation of authority and responsibility of the management and reporting mechanism.
- Monthly review of the financial and manufacturing operational performance of business units including key performance indicators, productivity, efficiency and effectiveness. This includes evaluation of factors such as business, operational and key management issues impacting on their performance.
- Regular visits to business and manufacturing units by GMD, Executive Directors and Senior Management personnel.
- Review of quarterly financial results of the Group by the Audit Committee and the Board.
- Identify and review the risk elements that impact on the financial performances of the Group and establish mechanism to manage risk including and not limiting to volatility of foreign exchange rates, escalating cost of operations and competitive pricing of products.
- Quarterly review on the adequacy and integrity of the Group's internal control system and to follow-up on action plans by Management on the recommendations proposed by the internal audit function.

The existing system of internal control has been in place for the year under review and up to the date of approval of this Statement for inclusion in the Annual Report.

ASSURANCE MECHANISM

The Audit Committee (AC) is tasked with the duty of reviewing and monitoring the effectiveness of the Group's risk management and system of internal control. The AC is assisted by the Group's in-house internal audit department as well as an outsourced independent professional firm that reports directly to the AC, to ensure that significant risks are indentified and the adequacy and integrity of the Group's risk management and internal control system is in place and effective. The internal audit department performs periodic reviews of key business processes to identify and evaluate significant operational, financial and compliance risks including assessing the effectiveness and adequacy of the system of risk management and internal control.

For the year ended 31 December 2013, the Internal Audit function reviewed the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control process and necessary actions have been/are being taken to remedy any significant failings or weaknesses for the financial year under review and up to the date of approval of this statement for inclusion in the annual report.

The AC reviewed the findings, recommendations, management response and action plans reported by the internal audit department and the independent professional firm and presented the AC's finding and recommendation to the Board on a quarterly basis.

The Board, through the AC, has reviewed the effectiveness of the Group's system of risk management and internal control. There were no significant risk management and internal control aspects that would have resulted in any material losses or contingencies that would require disclosure in the Group's Annual Report.

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Statement on Risk Management and Internal Control (continued)

The Board has received assurances from the GMD and the Senior Group Accountant that the Group's risk management and internal control system is operating adequately and effectively in all material aspects, based on the risk management and internal control system of the Group. Taking into consideration the information and assurances given, the Board is satisfied with the adequacy, integrity and effectiveness of the Group's system of risk management and internal control.

In addition, as part of the requirements of the ISO 9001, ISO 13485, ISO/TS 16949, MS ISO/IEC 17025 and ISO 14001 certifications, scheduled audits are being conducted internally as well as by external auditors from accredited certification bodies. Results of these audits are reported to the Quality Management Committee, which is chaired by the GMD.

BOARD'S COMMITMENT

The Board remains committed towards keeping abreast with the ever-changing business environment in order to support the Group's business and size of operations. There were no material losses incurred during the current financial year as a result of weaknesses in internal control.

The Board and the Management, in striving for continuous improvement, have and will continue to put in place appropriate measures to further strengthen the Group's system of risk management and internal control environment.

Report of the Audit Committee

The Board of Directors have pleasure in submitting the report of the Audit Committee of the Board for the year ended 31 December 2013.

1. TERMS OF REFERENCE OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

1.1. Composition

The Audit Committee shall consist of at least three Directors, all of whom are non executive and a majority of them are independent. The Chairman of the Audit Committee shall be an independent director.

1.2. Authority

The Audit Committee shall have explicit authority to investigate any matter within its terms of reference, have full access to information and the resources which it needs to do so. The Committee shall be able to obtain external professional advice and to invite outsiders with relevant experience to attend, if necessary.

1.3 Responsibility

The Audit Committee shall be the focal point for communication between external auditors, internal auditors, Directors and management on matters in connection with financial accounting, reporting and controls. It shall also ensure that accounting policies and practices are adhered to by the Company and its subsidiaries.

1.4. Functions

The duties of the Audit Committee shall include the following:

- (i) To consider the appointment of the external auditor and the audit fees and any questions of their resignation or dismissal;
- (ii) To discuss with the external auditor, before the audit commences, the nature and scope of the audit;
- (iii) To review the quarterly and year-end financial statements of the Company and the Group, focusing particularly on:
 - any changes in major accounting policies and practices;
 - significant adjustments arising from the audit;
 - significant and unusual events;
 - the going concern assumption;
 - compliance with approved accounting standards and other legal requirements;
- (iv) To discuss problems and reservations arising from the interim and final audits, and any matter the auditor may wish to discuss;
- (v) To review the external auditor's audit report, management letter and management's response;
- (vi) To review the assistance given by the employees of the Company and its subsidiaries to the external auditor;
- (vii) To consider the appointment of the internal auditor, their remuneration and any questions of their resignation or dismissal;
- (viii) To review the internal audit functions namely:
 - the adequacy of the scope, functions, competency and resources of the internal audit function, and that it has the necessary authority to carry out its work;
 - the internal audit program and results of the internal audit process and where necessary ensure that appropriate action is taken on the recommendations of the internal auditor;
 - the performance of the internal auditor, whose role includes the examination and evaluation of the Company's operations and their compliance with the relevant policies, codes and legislations;
- (ix) To consider any related party transactions and conflict of interest situations that may arise within the Company or Group:
- (x) To consider the major findings of internal investigations and management's response; and
- (xi) To consider other topics as defined by the Board.

1.5 Meeting and Minutes

- (i) The Audit Committee shall meet regularly, with due notice of issues to be discussed and shall record its conclusions in discharging its duties and responsibilities.
- (ii) The quorum for any meeting shall be at least two, the majority of whom must be independent Directors.
- (iii) The Secretary of the Committee shall be the Company Secretary.

2. COMPOSITION AND ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS

The initial application of the abovementioned standards, amendments and interpretations are not expected to have any material financial impacts to the current period and prior period financial statements of the Group and the Company.

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis other than as disclosed in Note 2.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM"), which is the Company's functional currency. All financial information is presented in RM and has been rounded to the nearest thousand, unless otherwise stated.

(d) Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with MFRSs requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

There are no significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements other than those disclosed in the following notes:

- Note 6 deferred tax assets
- Note 7 measurement of the recoverable amounts of cash-generating units

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to the periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by Group entities, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Basis of consolidation

(i) Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are entities, including unincorporated entities, controlled by the Company. The financial statements of subsidiaries are included in the consolidated financial statements from the date that control commences until the date that control ceases.

The Group adopted MFRS 10, *Consolidated Financial Statements* in the current financial year. This resulted in changes to the following policies:

• Control exists when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. In the previous financial years, control exists when the Group has the ability to exercise its power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(a) Basis of consolidation (continued)

(i) Subsidiaries (continued)

- Potential voting rights are considered when assessing control only when such rights are substantive. In the
 previous financial years, potential voting rights are considered when assessing control when such rights are
 presently exercisable.
- The Group considers it has de facto power over an investee when, despite not having the majority of voting rights, it has the current ability to direct the activities of the investee that significantly affect the investee's return. In the previous financial years, the Group did not consider de facto power in its assessment of control.

The change in accounting policy has been made retrospectively and in accordance with the transitional provision of MFRS 10. The adoption of MFRS 10 has no significant impact to the financial statements of the Group.

Investments in subsidiaries are measured in the Company's statement of financial position at cost less any impairment losses, unless the investment is classified as held for sale or distribution. The cost of investments includes transaction costs.

(ii) Business combinations

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method from the acquisition date, which is the date on which control is transferred to the Group.

For new acquisitions, the Group measures the cost of goodwill at the acquisition date as:

- the fair value of the consideration transferred; plus
- the recognised amount of any non-controlling interests in the acquiree; plus
- if the business combination is achieved in stages, the fair value of the existing equity interest in the acquiree; less
- · the net recognised amount (generally fair value) of the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed.

When the excess is negative, a bargain purchase gain is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

For each business combination, the Group elects whether it measures the non-controlling interests in the acquiree either at fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets at the acquisition date.

Transaction costs, other than those associated with the issue of debt or equity securities, that the Group incurs in connection with a business combination are expensed as incurred.

(iii) Acquisitions of non-controlling interests

The Group treats all changes in its ownership interest in a subsidiary that do not result in a loss of control as equity transactions between the Group and its non-controlling interest holders. Any difference between the Group's share of net assets before and after the change, and any consideration received or paid, is adjusted to or against Group reserves.

(iv) Non-controlling interests

Non-controlling interests at the end of the reporting period, being the equity in a subsidiary not attributable directly or indirectly to the equity holders of the Company, are presented in the consolidated statement of financial position and statement of changes in equity within equity, separately from equity attributable to the owners of the Company. Non-controlling interests in the results of the Group is presented in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income as an allocation of the profit or loss and the comprehensive income for the year between non-controlling interests and owners of the Company.

Losses applicable to the non-controlling interests in a subsidiary are allocated to the non-controlling interests even if doing so causes the non-controlling interests to have a deficit balance.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(a) Basis of consolidation (continued)

(v) Transactions eliminated on consolidation

Intra-group balances and transactions, and any unrealised income and expenses arising from intra-group transactions, are eliminated in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

Unrealised gains arising from transactions with equity-accounted associates and joint ventures are eliminated against the investment to the extent of the Group's interest in the investees. Unrealised losses are eliminated in the same way as unrealised gains, but only to the extent that there is no evidence of impairment.

(b) Foreign currency

(i) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated to the respective functional currencies of Group entities at exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the end of the reporting period are retranslated to the functional currency at the exchange rate at that date.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are not retranslated at the end of the reporting date except for those that are measured at fair value are retranslated to the functional currency at the exchange rate at the date that the fair value was determined.

Foreign currency differences arising on retranslation are recognised in profit or loss, except for differences arising on the retranslation of available-for-sale equity instruments or a financial instrument designated as a hedge of currency risk, which are recognised in other comprehensive income.

(ii) Operations denominated in functional currencies other than Ringgit Malaysia

The assets and liabilities of operations denominated in functional currencies other than RM, including goodwill and fair value adjustments arising on acquisition, are translated to RM at exchange rates at the end of the reporting period, except for goodwill and fair value adjustments arising from business combinations before 1 January 2011 (the date when the Group first adopted MFRS) which are treated as assets and liabilities of the Company. The income and expenses of foreign operations are translated to RM at exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

Foreign currency differences are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the foreign currency translation reserve (FCTR) in equity. However, if the operation is a non-wholly-owned subsidiary, then the relevant proportionate share of the translation difference is allocated to the non-controlling interests. When a foreign operation is disposed of such that control, significant influence or joint control is lost, the cumulative amount in the FCTR related to that foreign operation is reclassified to profit or loss as part of gains or loss on disposal.

When the Group disposes of only part of its interest in a subsidiary that includes a foreign operation, the relevant proportion of the cumulative amount is reattributed to non-controlling interests. When the Group disposes of only part of its investment in an associate or joint venture that includes a foreign operation while retaining significant influence or joint control, the relevant proportion of the cumulative amount is reclassified to profit or loss.

In the consolidated financial statements, when settlement of a monetary item receivable from or payable to a foreign operation is neither planned nor likely in the foreseeable future, foreign exchange gains and losses arising from such a monetary item are considered to form part of a net investment in a foreign operation and are recognised in other comprehensive income, and are presented in the FCTR in equity.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(c) Financial instruments

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Group or the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial instrument is recognised initially, at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial instrument not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial instrument.

An embedded derivative is recognised separately from the host contract and accounted for as a derivative if, and only if, it is not closely related to the economic characteristics and risks of the host contract and the host contract is not categorised at fair value through profit or loss. The host contract, in the event an embedded derivative is recognised separately, is accounted for in accordance with policy applicable to the nature of the host contract.

(ii) Financial instrument categories and subsequent measurement

The Group and the Company categorise financial instruments as follows:

Financial assets

(a) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Fair value through profit or loss category comprises financial assets that are held for trading, including derivatives (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument) or financial assets that are specifically designated into this category upon initial recognition.

Derivatives that are linked to and must be settled by delivery of unquoted equity instruments whose fair values cannot be reliably measured are measured at cost.

Other financial assets categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at their fair values with the gain or loss recognised in profit or loss.

(b) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables category comprises debt instruments that are not quoted in an active market.

Financial assets categorised as loans and receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(c) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale category comprises investment in equity and debt securities instruments that are not held for trading.

Investments in equity instruments that do not have a quoted market price in an active market and whose fair value cannot be reliably measured are measured at cost. Other financial assets categorised as available-for-sale are subsequently measured at their fair values with the gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income, except for impairment losses, foreign exchange gains and losses arising from monetary items and gains and losses of hedged items attributable to hedge risks of fair value hedges which are recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition, the cumulative gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from equity into profit or loss. Interest calculated for a debt instrument using the effective interest method is recognised in profit or loss.

(c) Available-for-sale financial assets (continued)

All financial assets, except for those measured at fair value through profit or loss, are subject to review for impairment (see Note 2(i)(i)).

Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost other than those categorised as fair value through profit or loss.

Fair value through profit or loss category comprises financial liabilities that are derivatives (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument) or financial liabilities that are specifically designated into this category upon initial recognition.

Derivatives that are linked to and must be settled by delivery of equity instruments that do not have a quoted price in an active market for identical instruments whose fair values otherwise cannot be reliably measured are measured at cost.

Other financial liabilities categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at their fair values with the gain or loss recognised in profit or loss.

(iii) Derecognition

A financial asset or part of it is derecognised when, and only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or the financial asset is transferred to another party without retaining control or substantially all risks and rewards of the asset. On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) and any cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

A financial liability or a part of it is derecognised when, and only when, the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the consideration paid, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(d) Property, plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset and any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. The cost of self-constructed assets also includes the cost of materials and direct labour. For qualifying assets, borrowing costs are capitalised in accordance with the accounting policy on borrowing costs. Cost also may include transfers from equity of any gain or loss on qualifying cash flow hedges of foreign currency purchases of property, plant and equipment.

Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment.

The cost of property, plant and equipment recognised as a result of a business combination is based on fair value at acquisition date and in accordance to Note 2(q).

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(d) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

(i) Recognition and measurement (continued)

When significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

The gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and is recognised net within "other income" and "other expenses" respectively in profit or loss.

(ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing a component of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the component will flow to the Group or the Company, and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced component is derecognised to profit or loss. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

(iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is based on the cost of an asset less its residual value. Significant components of individual assets are assessed, and if a component has a useful life that is different from the remainder of that asset, then that component is depreciated separately.

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives unless it is reasonably certain that the Group will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term. Freehold land is not depreciated. Property, plant and equipment under construction are not depreciated until the assets are ready for their intended use.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at the end of the reporting period and adjusted as appropriate.

(e) Leased assets

(i) Finance lease

Leases in terms of which the Group or the Company assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. Upon initial recognition, the leased asset is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of the minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments made under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Contingent lease payments are accounted for by revising the minimum lease payments over the remaining term of the lease when the lease adjustment is confirmed.

Leasehold land which in substance is a finance lease is classified as property, plant and equipment.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(e) Leased assets (continued)

(ii) Operating lease

Leases, where the Group or the Company does not assume substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as operating leases and the leased assets are not recognised on the statement of financial position.

Property interest held under an operating lease, which is held to earn rental income or for capital appreciation or both, is classified as investment property and measured using fair value model.

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised in profit or loss as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease. Contingent rentals are charged to profit or loss in the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Leasehold land which in substance is an operating lease is classified as prepaid lease payments.

(iii) Hire purchase

Property, plant and equipment held under hire purchase are capitalised and depreciated over their estimated useful lives, and the corresponding obligation relating to the remaining capital payments are treated as liability.

(f) Intangible assets

Goodwill

Goodwill arises on business combinations is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. In respect of equity-accounted investees, the carrying amount of goodwill is included in the carrying amount of the investment and an impairment loss on such an investment is not allocated to any asset, including goodwill, that forms part of the carrying amount of the equity-accounted investee.

(g) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

The cost of inventories is measured based on the first-in first-out principle, and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories, production or conversion costs and other costs incurred in bringing them to their existing location and condition. In the case of work-in-progress and finished goods, cost includes an appropriate share of production overheads based on normal operating capacity.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

The fair value of inventories acquired in a business combination is determined based on the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and sale, and a reasonable profit margin based on the effort required to complete and sell the inventories.

(h) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand, balances and deposits with banks and highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in fair value with original maturities of three months or less, and are used by the Group and the Company in the management of their short term commitments. For the purpose of the statements of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are presented net of bank overdrafts and pledged deposits.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(i) Impairment

(i) Financial assets

All financial assets (except for financial assets categorised as fair value through profit or loss and investments in subsidiaries) are assessed at each reporting date whether there is any objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events having an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the asset. Losses expected as a result of future events, no matter how likely, are not recognised. For an investment in an equity instrument, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value below its cost is an objective evidence of impairment. If any such objective evidence exists, then the impairment loss of the financial asset amount is estimated.

An impairment loss in respect of loans and receivables is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account.

An impairment loss in respect of available-for-sale financial assets is recognised in the profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the asset's acquisition cost (net of any principal repayment and amortisation) and the asset's current fair value, less any impairment loss previously recognised. Where a decline in the fair value of an available-for-sale financial asset has been recognised in the other comprehensive income, the cumulative loss in other comprehensive income is reclassified from equity to profit or loss.

An impairment loss in respect of unquoted equity instrument that is carried at cost is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the financial asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss for an investment in an equity instrument classified as available for sale is not reversed through profit or loss.

If, in a subsequent period, the fair value of a debt instrument increases and the increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in profit or loss, the impairment loss is reversed, to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not been recognised at the date the impairment is reversed. The amount of the reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

(ii) Other assets

The carrying amounts of other assets (except for inventories and deferred tax asset) are reviewed at the end of each reporting period to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. For goodwill, and intangible assets that have indefinite useful lives or that are not yet available for use, the recoverable amount is estimated each period at the same time.

For the purpose of impairment testing, assets are grouped together into the smallest group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or cash-generating units. Subject to an operating segment ceiling test, for the purpose of goodwill impairment testing, cash-generating units to which goodwill has been allocated are aggregated so that the level at which impairment testing is performed reflects the lowest level at which goodwill is monitored for internal reporting purposes. The goodwill acquired in a business combination, for the purpose of impairment testing, is allocated to group of cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination.

The recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs of disposal. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset or cash-generating unit.

An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or its related cash-generating unit exceeds its estimated recoverable amount.

(ii) Other assets (continued)

Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. Impairment losses recognised in respect of cash-generating units are allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the cash-generating unit (group of cash-generating units) and then to reduce the carrying amounts of the other assets in the cash-generating unit (groups of cash-generating units) on a pro rata basis.

An impairment loss in respect of goodwill is not reversed. In respect of other assets, impairment losses recognised in prior periods are assessed at the end of each reporting period for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised. Reversals of impairment losses are credited to profit or loss in the financial year in which the reversals are recognised.

(j) Equity instruments

Instruments classified as equity are measured at cost on initial recognition and are not remeasured subsequently.

(i) Issue expenses

Costs directly attributable to the issue of instruments classified as equity are recognised as a deduction from equity.

(ii) Ordinary shares

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

(iii) Repurchase, disposal and reissue of share capital (treasury shares)

When share capital recognised as equity is repurchased, the amount of the consideration paid, including directly attributable costs, net of any tax effects, is recognised as a deduction from equity. Repurchased shares that are not subsequently cancelled are classified as treasury shares in the statement of changes in equity.

Where treasury shares are distributed as share dividends, the cost of the treasury shares is applied in the reduction of the share premium account or distributable reserves, or both.

Where treasury shares are sold or reissued subsequently, the difference between the sales consideration net of directly attributable costs and the carrying amount of the treasury shares is recognised in equity, and the resulting surplus or deficit on the transaction is presented in share premium.

(iv) Distributions of assets to owners of the Company

The Group measures a liability to distribute assets as a dividend to the owners of the Company at the fair value of the assets to be distributed. The carrying amount of the dividend is remeasured at each reporting period and at the settlement date, with any changes recognised directly in equity as adjustments to the amount of the distribution. On settlement of the transaction, the Group recognises the difference, if any, between the carrying amount of the assets distributed and the carrying amount of the liability in profit or loss.

(k) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations in respect of salaries, annual bonuses, paid annual leave and sick leave are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided.

(k) Employee benefits (continued)

(i) Short-term employee benefits (continued)

A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid under short term cash bonus or profit-sharing plans if the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

(ii) State plans

The Group's contributions to statutory pension funds are charged to profit or loss in the financial year to which they relate. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in future payments is available.

(I) Revenue and other income

(i) Goods sold

Revenue from the sale of goods in the course of ordinary activities is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discount and volume rebates. Revenue is recognised when persuasive evidence exists, usually in the form of an executed sales agreement, that the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the customer, recovery of the consideration is probable, the associated costs and possible return of goods can be estimated reliably, and there is no continuing management involvement with the goods, and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. If it is probable that discounts will be granted and the amount can be measured reliably, then the discount is recognised as a reduction of revenue as the sales are recognised.

(ii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised as it accrues using the effective interest method in profit or loss except for interest income arising from temporary investment of borrowings taken specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset which is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy on borrowing costs.

(iii) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised in profit or loss on the date that the Group's or the Company's right to receive payment is established, which in the case of quoted securities is the ex-dividend date.

(m) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs that are not directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are capitalised as part of the cost of those assets.

The capitalisation of borrowing costs as part of the cost of a qualifying asset commences when expenditure for the asset is being incurred, borrowing costs are being incurred and activities that are necessary to prepare the asset for its intended use or sale are in progress. Capitalisation of borrowing costs is suspended or ceases when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying asset for its intended use or sale are interrupted or completed.

Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(n) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Current tax and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination or items recognised directly in equity or other comprehensive income.

Current tax is the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous financial years.

Deferred tax is recognised using the liability method, providing for temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position and their tax bases. Deferred tax is not recognised for the following temporary differences: the initial recognition of goodwill, the initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss. Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to the temporary differences when they reverse, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity, or on different tax entities, but they intend to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis or their tax assets and liabilities will be realised simultaneously.

A deferred tax asset is recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary difference can be utilised. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised.

Unutilised reinvestment allowance and investment tax allowance, being tax incentives that is not a tax base of an asset, is recognised as a deferred tax asset to the extent that it is probable that the future taxable profits will be available against the unutilised tax incentive can be utilised.

(o) Earnings per ordinary share

The Group presents basic and diluted earnings per share data for its ordinary shares ("EPS").

Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period, adjusted for own shares held.

Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding adjusted for own shares held for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares, which comprise convertible notes and share options granted to employees.

(p) Operating segments

An operating segment is a component of the Group that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, including revenues and expenses that relate to transactions with any of the Group's other components. An operating segment's operating results are reviewed regularly by the chief operating decision maker, which in this case is the Chief Executive Officer of the Group, to make decisions about resources to be allocated to the segment and to assess its performance, and for which discrete financial information is available.

(q) Fair value measurement

From 1 January 2013, the Group adopted MFRS 13, *Fair Value Measurement* which prescribed that fair value of an asset or a liability, except for lease transactions, is determined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(q) Fair value measurement (continued)

For non-financial asset, the fair value measurement takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

In accordance with the transitional provision of MFRS 13, the Group applied the new fair value measurement guidance prospectively, and has not provided any comparative fair value information for new disclosures. The adoption of MFRS 13 has not significantly affected the measurements of the Group's assets or liabilities other than the additional disclosures.

For the purpose of impairment testing, the carrying amounts are allocated to the individual entities which are the cash-generating units ("CGU"). Recoverable amount of each CGU is estimated based on its value-in-use. The value-in-use calculations apply a discounted cash flow model using cash flow projections based on past experiences, actual operating results and financial budgets approved by management covering a 5-year (2012:5-year) period.

The key assumptions for the computation of value-in-use of goodwill, pertained to cleanroom entity, include the following:

- The revenue growth in the 5-year (2012:5-year) cash flow projection is estimated at a compounded annual growth rate of 25% supported by historical trend (2012: 25%).
- The terminal value was estimated using the perpetuity growth model, with a growth rate to perpetuity of 2% (2012: 2%).
- A pre-tax discount rate of 11.0% (2012: 12.0%) was applied in determining the recoverable amount of the unit. The discount rate was estimated based on an industry average weighted average cost of capital.
- There will be no other significant changes in the government policies and regulations which will directly affect the investees' businesses. The inflation for the operating expenses is in line with the estimated gross domestic product growth rate for the country based on the past trends.

The key assumptions represent management's assessment of future trends in the glove industry and are based on both external sources and internal sources (historical data).

The Group believes that no reasonably foreseeable changes in the above key assumptions that would cause the carrying values of these CGUs to materially exceed their recoverable amounts other than changes in the prevailing operating environment of which the impact is not ascertainable.

Segment capital expenditure

Segment capital expenditure is the total cost incurred during the financial year to acquire property, plant and equipment.

Geographical segments

The cleanroom segment is managed on a worldwide basis, but operates manufacturing facilities and sales offices in Malaysia and Hong Kong.

In presenting information on the basis of geographical segments, segment revenue is based on geographical location of the sales offices. 23.4 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of a financial loss to the Group if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Group's exposure to credit risk arises principally from its receivables from customers. The Company's exposure to credit risk arises principally from loans and advances to subsidiaries and financial guarantees given to banks for credit facilities granted to subsidiaries.

Receivables

Risk management objectives, policies and processes for managing the risk

Management has a credit policy in place and the exposure to credit risk is monitored on an ongoing basis. Credit evaluations are performed on all customers. It is the Group's policy that local customers who wish to trade on credit terms are subject to credit verification procedures, and hence there is no requirement for collateral. New overseas customers will be required either to trade in advance telegraphic transfer or letter of credits issued by reputable banks in countries where the customers are based. Once they become regular customers and proven to be creditworthy, these customers will be assigned a credit term approved by management and letter of credit will no longer be required.

Exposure to credit risk, credit quality and collateral

As at the end of the reporting period, the maximum exposure to credit risk arising from receivables is represented by the carrying amounts in the statement of financial position.

Management has taken reasonable steps to ensure that receivables that are neither past due nor impaired are stated at their realisable values. A significant portion of these receivables, especially for established subsidiaries, are regular customers that have been transacting with the Group. The Group uses ageing analysis to monitor the collectability of the receivables. Any receivables having significant balances past due more than 90 days, which are deemed to have higher credit risk, are monitored individually.

The Company provides unsecured financial guarantees to banks in respect of banking facilities granted to certain subsidiaries. The Company monitors on an ongoing basis the results of the subsidiaries and repayments made by the subsidiaries.

Exposure to credit risk, credit quality and collateral

The maximum exposure to credit risk amounts to RM168,970,000 (2012: RM199,001,000) representing the outstanding banking facilities of the subsidiaries as at the end of the reporting period. The Company provides financial guarantees to banks for credit facilities extended to certain subsidiaries. As at the end of the reporting period, the maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by their carrying amounts in the statements of financial position.

Management services and loans and advances are only provided to subsidiaries which are wholly owned by the Company.

Impairment losses

As at the end of the reporting period, there was no indication that the loans and advances to the subsidiaries are not recoverable.

23.5 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Group's exposure to liquidity risk arises principally from its various payables and loans and borrowings.

Item 1 of the Agenda is intended for discussion only as the provision of Section 169(1) of the Companies Act, 1965 does not require a formal approval of the shareholders of the Audited Financial Statements. As such this item is not put forward for voting.

2. Proxy Form

- (i) A member entitled to attend and vote at the meeting is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote in his stead. A proxy may but need not be a member of the Company.
- (ii) Where a member appoints two (2) proxies, the appointment shall be invalid unless he specifies the proportion of his shareholdings to be represented by each proxy.
- (iii) A member who is an authorised nominee as defined under the Securities Industry (Central Depositories) Act 1991, may appoint one(1) proxy in respect of each securities account.
- (iv) Where a member is an exempt authorised nominee which holds shares in the Company for multiple beneficial owners in one securities account ("omnibus account") as defined under the Securities Industry (Central Depositories) Act 1991, there is no limit to the number of proxies which the exempt authorised nominee may appoint in respect of each omnibus account it holds.

3. Explanatory Notes on Special Business

(i) Proposed authority to allot shares pursuant to Section 132 D of the Companies Act, 1965

The proposed Ordinary Resolution 10, if passed, will empower the Directors from the conclusion of this AGM, to allot and issue up to a maximum of 10% of the issued share capital of the Company (excluding treasury shares) at the time of issue for such purposes as they consider would be in the best interest of the Company. This would eliminate any delay arising from and cost involved in convening a general meeting to obtain approval of the shareholders for such issuance of shares. This authority, unless revoked or varied at a general meeting, will expire at the conclusion of the next AGM of the Company.

This authority will provide flexibility to the Company for any possible fund raising exercise, including but not limited to placement of shares for purpose of funding investment projects, working capital and/or acquisition.

At this juncture, there is no decision to issue new shares. If there should be a decision to issue new shares after the general mandate is sought, the Company will make an announcement in respect thereof.

(ii) Proposed renewal of existing shareholders' mandate for recurrent related party transactions of a revenue or trading nature ("Proposal")

The proposed Ordinary Resolutions 11,12 and 13 are to seek shareholders' approval on the related party transactions entered or to be entered into by the Kossan Group in the ordinary course of business. These are recurring transactions of a revenue or trading nature which are likely to occur with some degree of frequency and may arise at any time and from time to time. These transactions may be constrained by the time-sensitive nature and confidentiality of such transactions, and it may be impractical to seek shareholders' approval on a case-by- case basis before entering into such related party transactions.

As such the Board is seeking an approval and renewal of shareholders' mandate pursuant to Part E, Paragraph 10.09 of the Main Market Listing Requirements of the Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad for the related party transactions described in Section 2.5 of the Circular to shareholders dated 30 May 2014 to allow the Kossan Group to enter into such recurrent related party transactions, make at arm's length basis and on normal commercial terms, not more favourable to the related parties than those generally available to the public and which will not be to the detriment of the minority shareholders of the Company. Further details on the Proposal can be obtained from the Circular to shareholders of the Company dated 30 May 2014.

By obtaining the shareholders' mandate and the renewal of the same on an annual basis, the necessity to convene separate general meetings from time to time to seek shareholders' approval as and when such recurrent related party transactions occur would not arise. This would reduce substantial administrative time, inconvenience and expenses associated with the convening of such meetings, without compromising the corporate objective of the Kossan Group or adversely affecting the business opportunities available to the Kossan Group.

(iii) Proposed Renewal of Authority for Share Buy-back
